	• To discuss the interrelationship between civil and political rights and the right to development,
	• to examine conceptual issues surrounding the intersection of these two frameworks,
	• to elucidate the historical and theoretical relationship between the right to development and civil and political rights,
	• to shed light on the right to development within the African Human Rights System, including the problem of illicit financial flows.

	• Recommendations for integrating the right to development into the monitoring and enforcement mechanisms of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights,
	• Insights into advancing the right to development within regional human rights frameworks, particularly in Africa.
Format:	The panel discussion is limited to three hours. The presentations by the panellists will be followed by an interactive discussion and conclusions from the panellists. States or observers, national human rights institution and non-governmental organizations will have the opportunity to raise issues and to ask panellists questions.
