# **UN-Civil Society Dialogue on Climate, Biodiversity & Gender**

### **Concept Note**

## **Background**

The UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework (UNSDCF) is the single most important planning instrument and partnership compact at the country level. The five-year strategic framework articulates the UN Country Team's support to Thailand's commitments to advance the SDGs and deliver on the three outcomes: 1) creating an inclusive, green, and low-carbon economy; 2) strengthening human capital development with a focus on digitization; and 3) ensuring all people benefit from development free from discrimination and leaving no one behind. These outcomes hinge on strong partnerships and reinforce the UN Secretary General's Common Agenda to invest in deep listening to renew social contract, strengthen voices of the future generations, strengthen multilateralism, and protect the global commons and public goods.

To collectively deliver on the Cooperation Framework priorities, the UN Country Team is leveraging its convening power to coordinate strategic dialogues with key stakeholders including the government, private sector<sup>1</sup>, and civil society.

In recognition of the crucial contribution by civil society actors as an indispensable enabler in advancing the SDGs, the UN institutionalized a formal dialogue that bring a wide range of civil society organizations together and provide safe space for engagement and support integrated rights-based development solutions that leave no one behind. These dialogues are in line with the UN Secretary General's (SG) Call to Action for Human Rights (C2A)<sup>2</sup>, which identifies public participation and civic space as a key area for achieving the 2030 Agenda, as well as the UN Guidance Note on Protecting and Promoting Civic Space<sup>3</sup>. The first such dialogue was held in 2022, which brought together nearly 80 civil society representatives to discuss the draft NPO Act and the UNCT plans to build on this by convening regular UNCT-CSO dialogues to promote and protect civic space and build partnerships in delivering on the UNSDCF.

In 2023, UN-CSO dialogue will focus on the triple planetary crises of climate change, biodiversity loss and pollution, which have disproportionate impacts on vulnerable groups including women and girls and those segments of the population that are already in vulnerable situations, including indigenous peoples, children, older persons, and persons with disabilities. In a step to counter environmental crises, the UN General Assembly in July 2022 adopted resolution A/RES/76/300 on the right to a clean, healthy, and sustainable environment<sup>4</sup>. The resolution provides a unique opportunity to address environmental
