II. Annotations to the provisional agenda

Item 1

Adoption of the agenda and organization of the work

Agenda

1. The provisional agenda of the seventy-seventh executive session of the Trade and Development Board was approved at the closing plenary of the seventy-first session of the Board. The provisional agenda for the session is reproduced in chapter I above.

Item 2

Interdependence and development strategies in a globalized world

2. Deliberations by the Trade and Development Board under the agenda item will provide an opportunity to consider the *Trade and Development Report 2024: Rethinking Development in the Age of Discontent.*

3. In the report, several ongoing shifts are identified that, together, create an inflection point in globalization. New technologies associated with green transition, artificial intelligence, bioinformatics and financial innovation herald the dawn of the next global growth wave. Geopolitical tensions rippling through trade and investment decisions may lead to stepped-up homeshoring. The current geo-economic and geopolitical pivot in globalization accentuates many problems long faced by developing countries. Pressures in global finance, trade and debt underscore imperatives to find development pathways to equitable and sustainable growth, advance the green transition and create a development-responsive international financial architecture. Opportunities are also arising, including for the global South to rearticulate its needs and priorities. These challenges are examined around five core themes:

- (a) A new, low normal for the global economy
- (b) The changing structure of trade and trade policies
- (c) The dawn of the service economy
- (d) Financialization in a new commodity cycle
- (e) The global South and its quest for long-term development finance.

Item 3

The Least Developed Countries Report 2024: Leveraging Carbon Markets for Development

4. The report explores how carbon markets can bridge gaps between economic growth and climate action in the least developed countries and their potential to mobilize capital for sustainable development. The least developed countries are early movers in carbon markets, but projects are highly concentrated in a few least developed countries. Carbon markets have not made a significant contribution to sustainable development finance or to climate finance in the least developed countries so far, and their sustainable development cobenefits have been limited. There is significant unused potential for carbon market projects in forestry, agriculture and renewable energy, provided that international carbon markets have prices that are high enough to attract investment in these projects. However, participating in carbon markets is costly and brings challenges, such as limiting policy space and having to cope with market instability. The report provides policy ideas on how to boost the contribution of carbon market participation to the sustainable development of the least developed countries.

Economic Survey of Latin America and the Caribbean 2024: Low-growth Trap, Climate Change and Employment Trends

5. The Trade and Development Board will be introduced to the *Economic Survey of Latin America and the Caribbean 2024: Low-growth Trap, Climate Change and Employment Trends* prepared by the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean. Latin America and the Caribbean is mired in a decades-long growth trap, and further hampered by global and regional conditions that limit the space for macroeconomic policies to spur economic growth in the region. The results of the economic survey reveal weaker job creation, particularly in the formal sector, with young people, women, older persons, migrants and rural dwellers among the most likely to be informal workers.
