


International Day of Commemoration in Memory of the Victims of the Holocaust

Commemoration of the 80th Anniversary of the liberation of the Nazi German concentration and extermination camp Auschwitz-Birkenau



27 January 2025 will mark the 80th anniversary of the liberation of the Nazi German concentration and extermination camp Auschwitz-Birkenau. Over one million people were murdered in this vast complex alone, most of them Jews. Marking this important anniversary and the International Day of Commemoration in Memory of the Victims of the Holocaust, UNESCO is organizing a series of events recalling the continued relevance to teach and learn about the Holocaust, globally.

These events are made possible with the generous support of Austria, France, Germany, the Principality of Monaco, and Poland. Musician Biographies

Hagar Sharvit

Hagar Sharvit is an Israeli mezzo-soprano who has performed widely across Europe, winning multiple prizes, including the 1st and Audience prizes at the "Das Lied" international song competition. She has appeared in renowned venues such as the Elbphilharmonie and Pierre Boulez Saal, with roles in operas by Händel, Mozart, and Rossini, and will debut in major productions of Rusalka and Die Liebe der Danae in 2024-2025.

Olivier Godin

Appointed as Artistic Director of Bourgie Hall of the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts in June 2022, Olivier Godin leads a remarkable career as a concert artist, chamber musician, and teacher both in Canada and abroad. With Wolfgang Holzmair, he shares a commitment to music from concentration camps. In recitals he also collaborated with singers such as Gordon Bintner, Marc Boucher, Julie Boulianne, Étienne Dupuis, Karina Gauvin, Hélène Guilmette, Marie-Nicole Lemieux, François Le Roux, Michèle Losier, Philippe Sly, and many others. In chamber settings, he has performed alongside with pianists like Michel Béroff, Suzanne Blondin, Myriam Farid, and François Zeitouni, cellist Stéphane Tétreault, and oboist Louise Pellerin.

He has performed in numerous festivals in Canada and at venues around the globe, including the Palazzetto Bru Zane in Venice, Wigmore Hall in London, and La Monnaie in Brussels. Olivier Godin has recorded thirty CDs to widespread critical acclaim, including the complete mélodies of Poulenc, Fauré, Duparc, and Dutilleux as well as Rachmaninoff's complete works for two pianos. Recently, he recorded Jules Massenet's 333 mélodies in their entirety with a dozen renowned singers for ATMA Classique. Appointed professor at the Conservatoire de musique de Montréal at age 25, Olivier Godin served as director of this institution's Atelier d'opéra for close to 15 years.

Wolfgang Holzmair

Wolfgang Holzmair (barytone) studied economics as well as singing and Lieder in Vienna and holds a master's degree from the renowned Mozarteum University (his thesis focused on rediscovering the work of Max Kowalski, a jewish lawyer and composer, who emigrated to London after he survived concentration camp in 1938). Thus, Wolfgang Holzmair began dealing with the musical legacy of concentration camp survivors very early in his professional career.

For years, Wolfgang Holzmair has been particularly committed to the works of composers who were persecuted and defamed as 'degenerate' under the nazi regime. He has released several CDs with recordings of works among others by Erich Zeisl, Franz Schreker and Ernst KrenekHe also released music from composers from the Theresienstadt ghetto.
